President's Letter

Whatever Happened to Gonstead?

In his book "Upside Down and Right Side Up with BJ", BJ describes what he calls the greatest mystery of history. He talks about a city in Cambodia, N'Angkor, a city with a population of 1 million and suburbs of 30 million, covering what current scientists are saying is almost 400 square miles. It would seem that something happened, and over a short period of time everyone in the city disappeared. In his book, BJ says the following "Then, where are all these people? Where have they gone? Why did they so suddenly disappear? When the end came why did they leave so suddenly as in one day? Did they migrate? If so, where? What became of them?....The unknown answer to THAT question is what makes this the greatest dead city of mystery the world now knows." In his book he goes on to share some ideas on what might have happened.

As a student at Palmer, of all the specialty techniques (as they were called at that time), the most popular was Gonstead. They had the largest club and it was my perception that they enjoyed the greatest acceptance. Gonstead was embraced and taught within Palmer's technique curriculum as early as 1964, long before I arrived. I heard Clarence Gonstead teach on campus. I was fortunate enough to be under quality Gonstead care at the Five Points Clinic.

Recently I did a search that included the Gonstead organizations and The Gonstead Clinic in Mt. Horeb, Wisconsin. I did a search for doctors trained in their protocols. I was utterly surprised to find that the presence of Gonstead in the field was a shadow of what I would have expected, given its dominance 30 – 40 years ago and its name recognition (we have all heard of Gonstead). Locally I could only find two practitioners; one had attended 3 conferences and another about 20.

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So, I learn that with time things change. We cannot ignore something, and then hope that 10 years later it will be there for us. NUCCA does not have the name recognition that Gonstead has, even to this day. What we do have is a committed group of people. Dr. Woodfield presented a NUCCA information session and research update for three classes on October 17th before the conference began that afternoon. It provided an excellent opportunity to present the NUCCA procedure and our research to a student audience. Several students were referred to the website for more information, and urged to visit the new Monograph website.



Sunday, October 19 began early, featuring five NUCCA presentations and an hour long panel discussing upper cervical chiropractic. Dr. Philip Schalow presented a case

report on myasthenia gravis, then gave Drs. Giffen's and Orem's relief of pediatric constipation presentation from the 2014 Spring NUCCA Conference. Dr. Schalow answered several questions on taking pediatric x-rays, adjusting and follow up care.

Dr. Woodfield presented "Changes in quality of life assessments and MRI measured intracranial compliance of migraine subjects receiving a National Upper Cervical Chiropractic Association (NUCCA) atlas correction." As Dr. Jon Chung had to leave early, the migraine presentation provided a great segway into his topic regarding a concussion case report. The other presentation, "Examiner reliability in analysis of orthogonal radiographs," received many comments and questions.

The Upper Cervical panel was a huge success in presenting unity among the upper cervical procedures. The topics included:

1. Current status of technique development of upper cervical approaches
2. Recent and historical research regarding upper cervical chiropractic
3. Differences in subluxation analysis and adjusting procedures used by various UC technique groups
4. Clinical/case management of patients presenting with UC subluxation
5. Collaboration among differing UC technique groups

10th IN-CAM Research Symposium

NUCCA was well represented at the 10th IN-CAM Research Symposium, with two posters and a platform presentation. "Initiating the development of a chiropractic practice based research network: Evaluating the feasibility of using online software to collect patient information," was presented by Dr. Jeff Scholten. The project received IN-CAM funding. Manuscript preparation is underway for publication in the indexed literature.




Dr. Hasick and Dr. Woodfield at poster

Drs. Hasick and Woodfield displayed a poster, "Changes in intracranial compliance and quality of life in migraine subjects receiving an atlas intervention," describing the findings of the NUCCA Migraine PC-MRI Study.

The Symposium had several interesting topics discussing studies on determining cost savings, studies on "N of 1" and several studies using heart rate variability as an outcome assessment in measuring autonomic effects from massage therapy.



The nutrition break sponsored by our organizations allowed opportunity for Drs. Scholten, Woodfield and Hasick to interact with many well-known IN-CAM researchers from across North America.

Dr. Scholten's poster titled, "Relationship between craniocervical orientation and centre of force of occlusion in adults" focused on the before and after NUCCA correction's effect on dental occlusion as measured with the Tech Scan instrument. This project is an exploration of a possible dynamic or functional assessment in determining presence of the Atlas Subluxation Complex.

NUCCA Phase Contrast Migraine Study

A manuscript titled, "Effect of atlas vertebrae realignment in subjects with migraine" was submitted to the Mayo Clinic Proceedings and we are currently waiting to hear from them. As the Proceedings have yet to publish a chiropractic paper, submission to Headache or Cephalalgia is the current contingency follow up.



Advanced MRI data analysis is underway at Magnetic Resonance Innovations, Inc. (<http://www.mrinnovations.com/>). This technology enhances images, allowing exploration of additional hemodynamic and hydrodynamic flow pattern changes. Dr. Beggs at Bradford University, UK will assist in interpretation of the advanced analysis to assist in preparing a manuscript.




Las Vegas, NV, March 19-21, 2015

Upper Cervical Council Update

The ICA's Council on Upper Cervical Care has been in development since a meeting of leaders in our community, facilitated by Dr. Gerry Clum, took place in 2008 at Life West Chiropractic College. Since that historic gathering, progress has continued and the first official elected board was installed in October of 2012. Elections allow for 1/3 of the board to be elected annually with the President and Vice-President being elected separately with bi-annual mandates.

The Upper Cervical Council has strength in our ability to accept the diverse opinions and findings of each upper cervical organization. We support the possibility that collaboration amongst the various upper cervical groups can bring growth for all organizations. As we work together to assimilate our divergent perspectives, and build on our commonalities, all of us will develop and gain knowledge from this process.

The council has a broad mandate and is very ambitious in its strategic plan:

- The immediate goal of the Council was to create, launch, and see to completion a successful Diplomate program in chiropractic upper cervical procedures. As the current Diplomate candidates begin their third and final year, this successful program is set to wrap up mid-2015, with graduation in early 2016 at the second Upper Cervical eXperience. A second Diplomate program will launch in early 2016. There are currently 20 Diplomate candidates, including a number of NUCCA members: Dr. Jeff Scholten, Dr. Johanna Hoeller, Dr. Trish Gregg, Dr. Jean Paul Bohemier, Dr. Matthew McNally, and Dr. Philip Schalow.
- The Council facilitated the development of an Upper Cervical Student Society to allow upper cervical to have a steady, collaborative, concise and clear voice on our campuses. Work is ongoing to allow for this autonomous group to be fully and successfully launched.
- The council has just submitted a paper for peer-review to a pub-med indexed journal entitled, "Cranio-cervical chiropractic procedures, a précis of upper cervical chiropractic" which, if published, will assist the profession in understanding the current state of development of upper cervical chiropractic.

- The Council has initiated the formation of a web-based learning hub dedicated to gathering and sharing information regarding all things related to the upper cervical spine; including general knowledge as well as technique-specific content. There will be space for all upper cervical procedure organizations that wish to participate, to have a dedicated area to increase knowledge about, and interest in, their own procedures.
- Upper Cervical Diplomates need to have an annual gathering. The Council has facilitated an amalgamation of this proposed conference with the current collaborative upper cervical community gatherings; Fusion, Evolution and Innovation. This new conference, called the Upper Cervical eXperience, took place February 26-28, 2015 in New Orleans. The 2016 Upper Cervical eXperience will be organized by the Upper Cervical Council and will feature the first graduate class of Diplomates in chiropractic upper cervical procedures.

The ICA's Council on Upper Cervical Care has excellent NUCCA representation: Dr. Jeffrey Scholten (President), Dr. Robert Brooks (Chairman), as well as Dr. Kyrie Kleinfelter and Dr. Bill Davis (Public Relations Committee).

The Council's influence is only as strong as its membership, and we request your involvement. Elections for Board positions (three year terms), are held annually in the fall, with the President and Vice-President elected biannually in even years. If you support the idea of a Specialist in Upper Cervical Chiropractic Procedures and unity between the various upper cervical procedures, please join us! Satisfaction Gained Through Adversity: Switching to NUCCA

For this edition of the "Spotlight", I thought I would go a different direction. At the last conference in Newport Beach, a classmate of mine and I were sitting with some Board Certified Doctors, and my classmate was sharing that this was his first NUCCA conference; his current intention is to start a new NUCCA practice from scratch. This means he needs to learn the actual procedure as well.

The folks at the table realized this was no small task, and we also figured it would be a great opportunity for a DOCTOR SPOTLIGHT.

I followed up with my friend and colleague, Dr. Andrew McCanse, to learn about his experience – victories and struggles – in starting a new NUCCA practice from scratch, while also learning the technique with minimal formal training thus far.

NN: Can you describe your journey to NUCCA for me?

AM: I originally practiced in South America for 3 years after graduation. During that time there was no access to quality, consistent x-rays and other tools to help with deciding when, where, and how to adjust... this meant I had to develop a different skillset when working with patients.

I began to find that the better patient outcomes came from less "invasive" force in the adjustment. I noticed that lighter force applications and fewer inputs would actually yield better results, such as stronger corrections, longer holds, and better symptomatic changes! I continued to

utilize less and less force to accomplish the correction and was working with a triceps pull-type of adjustment when addressing the upper cervical area. This ultimately led me to look into properly learning NUCCA.

It has simply been my desire and drive to attain better results. I took nobody's word for it, but through extensive testing and application of Chiropractic Principles, I'm finding that NUCCA is the way to go for me.

Upon returning to the US, I began speaking with friends and colleagues and sought out how to start the journey of doing "NUCCA Proper." Even with colleagues' encouragement, the process has actually been quite frustrating.

NN: What has been frustrating about this transition?

First and foremost, I am on my own. I don't have an office (associateship / mentorship) to learn the work, so I feel like my progress is slow thus far. The most difficult part has been figuring out the process to actually become NUCCA proficient!

The paradox is as follows: The website says go to the conference. At the conference, they say read the textbook. Everyone seems to say, "You don't learn NUCCA from the textbook, you have to go to the conference." When I went to the conference and asked where and how people learned the NUCCA work, most replied they had "done an associate position for x number of years..."

I've figured out that the best way to learn the work is by studying close with one in practice, like an associateship or mentorship. My struggle is that neither of these are a great option for me, so how am I to proceed?

Furthermore, I've learned that one either does NUCCA, or one does NOT. There isn't really any in between. You cannot "dabble" in NUCCA. Where I currently practice, I do not have the tools available to do it properly. I need to purchase a new X-ray system to allow me to take a vertex. Without a good vertex, I obviously can't do a proper analysis and so it goes....

In the meantime, I am working diligently on systems to improve my skills and analysis. I feel like it's really starting to come together, however, and I'm excited for when I move to my new location (9 months away) and have everything ready to go.

NN: Nice. I think once you pick up that new x-ray system, you'll be ready to go. You are much farther along than you think, and I'm excited for you. Any final thoughts to share?

Yes, please! Two things:

- 1) I received my first call from a patient looking specifically for a NUCCA Chiropractor. NUCCA was recommended by a close friend whom she trusts and respects. She received my name from the NUCCA website, as I am a dues paying member.

Here is the challenge: I do not have the tools in my current location to do NUCCA properly, so I really shouldn't have been on the website listing. I had a valuable conversation with her and she will be waiting 9 months until I open the new clinic and have the necessary tools available. She is excited about it, and so am I.

This part of the system may be worth looking into, as I did qualify to be listed, but I probably shouldn't have been. Upon this realization, I did contact NUCCA and ask to be taken off the directory until I have the new office, but to leave it up to the honor system may be a mistake, as folks could abuse the brand.

- 2) Obviously NUCCA is not something that is learned overnight, nor in a few years – it's a process that takes place over a lifetime. But there are a few resources that would be invaluable to someone in my circumstance:
 - Access to films to practice the analysis.
 - If NUCCA could set up a database (Google Drive) with a set of films (pre blank, pre analyzed/ post blank, post analyzed) this would help greatly.
 - Videos would help greatly
 - Going through the adjustment setup
 - Going through the legcheck
 - Going through the analysis
 - Going through the x-ray setup

NN: Thanks Dr. McCanse! We'll see you at the conference in April, and look forward to your progress!!

I may be biased, but Dr. McCanse's story is inspiring because it is one of integrity, class and excellence. It is one of a doctor coming to his own conclusions after rigorous testing of what he learned in school, and constantly striving to be better. Learning NUCCA is a daunting challenge, and I commend Dr. McCanse for grabbing it by the horns and taking it full-on. He is doing everything he can to become first proficient, and then excellent in this work, and he deserves our support, encouragement and congratulations.

I look forward to seeing you all at the conference in April!
